# News from our Local Air Cadet Squadrons

→ In September, cadets from 869 Sqn joined other squadrons on the South East Scotland Multi-Activity Camp. There was a wide range of activities on offer, including space, leadership and shooting. For the first time at this camp, bronze level fieldcraft was also on offer. The cadets learned about how to patrol, set up harbours, observe, and lots more.

#### 1143 (Portobello) Squadron

- → 1143 Sqn had the honour of hosting the Legion Scotland Area Committee who presented a cheque for £2500 to the Squadron to help in the purchase of their own Squadron gazebo. The gazebo will be used to help with the recruitment of Cadets & Staff as well as to assist at public events. During their visit, the Committee also presented cadets from the Banner & Drill Squad and Modelling Team with their medals and were given a tour of the Sqn premises.

→ 1739 Sqn teamed up with neighbouring squadrons for a fantastic visit to Marionville Fire Station (pictured below). The cadets had the opportunity to meet the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service and Police Scotland. Operational Support and Road Traffic Units kindly demonstrated their specialist equipment and shared valuable insights into their work keeping the local communities safe. Meanwhile, Blue Watch provided an in-depth tour of their appliance, water rescue kit, and the wide range of lifesaving operational equipment they use every day. An engaging and memorable night for all!



#### 1756 (Broxburn) Squadron

- → In August, cadets from 1756 Sqn attended a Battlefield Tour of France & Belgium alongside cadets from across the Scotland & Northern Ireland region. The tour was deeply moving and honoured those who served in the First World War. Cadets explored historic cemeteries, memorials, and battlefield sites, learning about the soldiers' experiences, the realities of trench warfare, and the decisions that shaped history. From personal stories of bravery to the strategic challenges of war, the tour offered powerful insights into the human cost of conflict. Highlights included:
- Visiting military museums and preserved trench systems
- Learning about key battles and individual soldiers' stories
- Reflecting at Commonwealth cemeteries and memorials
- Taking part in the poignant Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate in Ypres

This experience not only deepened cadets' understanding of WWI history, but also strengthened their appreciation for the values of service, sacrifice, and remembrance.





→ Cadets from 1756 Sqn enjoyed a trip to the Ayr International Festival of Flight in September. The cadets and staff had a blast taking photos of the fast jets and getting to see different types of aircraft from all over the world.

# 2535 (Livingston) Squadron

→ In October, Cadet Flt Sgt Martin (pictured right) was appointed Cadet Warrant Officer following a successful board interview. CWO is the highest rank you can achieve as a cadet, and it is excellent recognition of years of hard work, dedication and passion from CWO Martin.



# News from Across the Royal Air Force

#### From RAF News / BFBS Forces News

- → In August, Flying Officer Sarah Bonar represented Scotland in her second rugby world cup. She first played for the Scotland team in 2016.
- → 602 (City of Glasgow) Squadron RAuxAF gathered with veterans in the city's cathedral in September to commemorate the Battle of Britain and the founding of the squadron. The event celebrated the squadron's centenary.
- → A set of cufflinks presented to the RAF pilot who flew the Duke of Windsor's body back to the UK in 1972 sold at auction for £1,700 significantly more than the estimated £400. The gold cufflinks were given to Squadron Leader Denis Lowery by the late Queen.
- → A Battle of Britain Memorial Flight pilot, Squadron Leader Ben Polwin, made history this year by winning the 2025 King's Cup Air Race with his wife, a veteran of the Royal Canadian Air Force. With a one second race win resulting in winning the 2025 British Air Racing Championship, he has become the first service member since 1988 to win the trophy.
- → A former RAF weapons instructor has completed every single Tough Mudder obstacle course event held in the UK this year, raising almost £3,000 for a forces charity.
- → A replica spitfire and statue of Air Chief Marshal Lord Dowding, the Commander in Chief of Fighter Command during the Battle of Britain, has been unveiled in Moffat. The replica and statue are located in front of Dowding House, now a home for RAF veterans run by the RAF Association.
- → In October, the Inter Services Cycling Criterium Open Championships saw a full RAF podium for the first time as well as the RAF team winning the team champion title at Portsmouth. Success on two wheels also extended to the downhill mountain biking discipline, where the RAF achieved both the top podium place and team title in the Inter Services competition held at Innerleithen, Scottish Borders.

# New ID Card for Veterans


#### From BFBS Forces News

The new veteran ID card provides a memento of service and maintains a tangible link to the Armed Forces, while also allowing veterans to easily verify their service to the NHS, their local authority and charities, enabling them to access support and services where needed.

Thousands of Armed Forces veterans can apply for an ID card either online by visiting the GOV.UK website at <a href="https://www.gov.uk/veteran-card">www.gov.uk/veteran-card</a> or by making a paper-based application.

Veterans will be able to use their ID card to apply for a Defence Discount Service card and Veterans Railcard, and could be used as a form of voter identification in forthcoming elections.

Anyone interested in advice or details regarding the veteran ID card should contact Veterans UK, which is a 24-hour service that directs ex-forces personnel to a range of support available to them including housing, financial advice and career guidance.
